The National Lottery Community Fund - Awards for All (Scotland)

This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Voluntary and community groups, schools, community and town councils and health bodies can apply for grants of between £300 and £10,000 for projects which help improve local communities and the lives of people most in need. Projects must meet at least one of their three aims: bring people together and build strong relationships in and across communities; improve the places and spaces that matter to communities; help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage. Funding is available for activities including: putting on events, activities or performances; buying equipment; running training courses; starting a new group; educational toys and games; volunteer's expenses or professional fees; transport costs and refurbishment.

Andy Fanshawe Memorial Trust Grant (UK)

This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Charitable organisations, schools and youth groups that offer outdoor recreation opportunities can apply for funding for projects that allow young people to experience outdoor recreation. The Trust is likely to support groups representing those who are disadvantaged or who face particular challenges. The grant aims to support specific projects that encourage young people to further their existing skills and gain new experiences. Eligible expenditure includes equipment, course fees and trips. Expeditions abroad are not supported. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Happy Days Childrens Charity - Day Trips and Holidays Grant

This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Organisations catering for children with special needs such as schools, hospitals as well as individual families can apply for grants to provide vital respite breaks. There are three programmes: The Day Trip Grant fund for days out and theatre trips: Family Respite Breaks for short seaside or country breaks: Group Activity Holidays for which partial applications with joint funding are accepted. All trips usually take place in the UK and cater for disadvantaged young people with special needs including those in special needs schools, in hospitals and in hospices and individual families are also eligible. The applicant must represent a group of young people aged 3-17 with special needs, or represent a special needs school or special needs group. All key carers who will be accompanying children on the trip must be DBS cleared. Organisations must also have a child protection policy in place. The funding amount is discretionary and applications can be submitted at any time.

Foyle Foundation Schools Library Programme (UK)

This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

State funded secondary and primary schools as well as dedicated schools catering for those with Special Educational Needs (SEN) that do not have or want to improve their libraries can apply for funding through the Foyles Foundation Schools Library Programme. This programme recognises that there is no statutory requirement for schools to have a library and that many school libraries are in a desperate situation through underfunding and underdevelopment. Encouraging children to read widely from an early age will provide a major boost to improving literacy levels, which is a current key educational objective. Priority will be given to funding library books. The Foundation will also consider contributions towards library software, necessary IT equipment and specialist seating/desks. Preference will be given to schools which can clearly demonstrate that their library can be maintained and renewed in the future. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Roman Society School Grant (UK)

This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Roman Society is the leading organisation in the United Kingdom for those interested in the study of Rome and the Roman Empire. The Society's Schools Committee makes grants to schools to help promote the teaching of Latin and Roman studies. Most of the grants are awarded for the purchase of textbooks and other books on Roman topics, but the Committee also makes awards to groups and schools organising lectures or study days on Roman themes, and has recently made money available for archaeology fieldwork bursaries. Applications from schools planning to start courses in Latin are particularly welcome. Grants usually range from £50 to £600.

Japan Society Small Grants Programme (UK)

This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Japan Society Small Grants (formerly Japan 21 Awards) are made by the Society to enable small scale projects and events related to Japan to take place in the UK. Applications may be made by organisations as well as individuals who are based in the UK for projects and events related to Japan and Japanese culture. The maximum award is £1,000 and should not, in principle, cover more than 50% of the total budget. The Japan Society particularly encourages applications from those who are involved in organising grassroots projects and from schools and educational establishments. Applications can be made at any time.

<u>Classical Association Awards (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Classical Association has in the region of £60,000 each year and is a major giver of grants to classical projects, mainly but not exclusively in the UK. Funding is available for: Attendance at Summer Schools: Bursaries for courses specifically aimed at teachers' professional development: Funding for Conferences on a Classical theme hosted by UK Classics departments with substantial postgraduate participation: Bursaries can be made for attendees to the CA Conference: Schoolteaching and Outreach Activities including talks, interactive sessions and support for visits to schools who would otherwise find it difficult to attend such activites: Major Projects (for example, the New Greek Lexicon Project) and other initiatives may also be funded.

<u>Sportscotland Facilities Fund (Scotland)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Sports Facilities Fund provides funding for the provision or upgrading of all sports facilities for the general community. Proposals must be led by local authorities, clubs and trusts. Applicants need to demonstrate that the proposed development is for the public good and will provide equitable opportunities for increased sports participation by the community at local level. They will also need to demonstrate what links they have established/will establish with the sports programmes and/or initiatives operated by the local authority, national governing body for sport and their associates/partners.

<u>Greggs Foundation Breakfast Club Grants (England, Scotland, Wales & Belfast)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The first Greggs funded breakfast club was established in 1999 as part of a Business in the Community 'Seeing is Believing' event. The event was in response to growing concerns that children were attending school without having breakfast. The Greggs Foundation now oversees 380 clubs, providing a healthy breakfast to over 22,000 school children each day, over 4 million each year; encouraging the use of parent volunteers in breakfast club. Research has shown many benefits including

improved parent/teacher relationships, increased confidence, self-esteem and social mobility.

<u>Institute of Physics - School Grants Scheme (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. The closing date will be confirmed on website.

UK schools and colleges catering for pupils in the age range 5-19 can apply for funding from the Particle Physics and Astronomy Research Council for small-scale projects or events linked to the teaching or promotion of physics and engineering. Grants of up to £600 may contribute to costs such as running a science week activity, organising a visit to or from a working physicist, supply cover, transport, marketing and publicity, and materials/resources.

Tap Water Awards (UK) This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Tapwater.org is a not for profit organisation who promote the drinking of tap water in the UK and aim to reduce the use of expensive and environmentally damaging bottled waters. The Tap Water Awards programme aims to help schools significantly reduce our reliance on single-use plastics and the amount of plastic waste the UK generates. This is achieved by supporting schools install mains fed drinking water machines and using reusable bottles. We encourage reducing educational establishments dependency on expensive plastic bottled water. Schools, colleges or universities wishing to apply are strongly advised to contact tapwater.org before applying.

<u>Edina Trust - Science Grant Scheme (England, Scotland and Wales)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Edina Trust provides grants, for state primary schools in certain regions of the UK, to be used to promote the teaching of science and gardening. The Science Grant Scheme provides grants of up to £600 for full-school science weeks; scientific visits - for trips out of, or visits to the school; purchase of science equipment (but not ipads); school gardening clubs; and improving school grounds for science; etc.

<u>Woodland Trust - Free Trees (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Woodland Trust has free tree packs to give away to schools, community and youth groups. The free tree packs are available for planting on one publicly accessible site. Packs will be awarded on a first come first serve basis. All applicants need to do is find a suitable site and supply the volunteer planters and tree protection. Tree packs for schools and communities offer the perfect opportunity to bring people together to plant trees - encouraging local wildlife, protecting our landscape against tree disease and creating beautiful woodled areas that people can enjoy for years to come.

<u>The McCrone Charitable Trust (Glasgow and West of Scotland)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Trust supports the relief of poverty, education and religion as well as general charitable purposes in Glasgow and the West of Scotland.

<u>The London Mathematical Society (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date for applications is 30th November 2021.

The London Mathematical Society has announced that Mathematics Teachers in the UK can apply for grants of up to £400 to attend specific one or two day conferences/events organised by professional mathematical organisations. The aim of the grant is to facilitate mathematical professional development to allow teachers in UK schools/educational institutions to develop their subject knowledge. The grant can contribute to the costs of registration for the course and a proportion of the travel and subsistence expenses of attendees. Any application for a grant under this scheme must be made by a teacher of mathematics or ITE provider based in the UK.

Magic Breakfast (UK) This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Magic Breakfast is a UK charity, dedicated to ensuring every child starts the day with the right breakfast as fuel for learning. They provide free, nutritious breakfast food (bagels, porridge, orange juice and cereals) to over 167,000 children in 960 Primary, Secondary and Special Educational Needs schools every day. They target schools where over 35% of the children are living in poverty and eligible for Free School Meals.

<u>Charles Wolfson Charitable Trust (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Trust makes grants to registered charities, or to hospitals and schools and similar charitable institutions in the areas of Medicine; Education and Welfare. Grants tend to be awarded for capital and fixed term projects.

B&Q Waste Donate Scheme (UK) This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Schools, charities and community groups can apply for products and waste materials through the B&Q Waste Donate Scheme. B&Q operates this Scheme through all of its stores within the UK. B&Q donates products and waste materials they haven't been able to sell for re-use such as slightly damaged tins of paint, offcuts of timber, odd rolls of wallpaper and end-of-range materials. Donated products should benefit the local community and the environment and can not be resold. Due to its Health and Safety scheme, electrical, petrol and gas items are not available for donation. Applications must be made directly to B&Q stores.

<u>Institute of Mathematics Education Grant Scheme (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

Individuals working in secondary schools, Colleges of Further Education (FE) and Higher Education Institutes (HEIs) can apply for a grant to help with the costs of running or attending an educational activity relating to mathematics. The types of activities supported can include hosting a mathematics event, e.g. Maths Trails, Maths Competitions; attendance at appropriate conferences, e.g. Mathematics Works; travel expenses to attend appropriate events; supply cover required for the teacher to attend the appropriate event; etc.

<u>IGas Community Fund (England & Scotland)</u> This grant is **open to applications**. The closing date will be confirmed on website.

IGas Energy Plc, one of the UK's leading onshore hydrocarbon producers awards grants to help local communities located close to the oil and gas production and exploration sites where they operate. The fund covers specific areas of Hampshire, Surrey, Sussex, Lincolnshire, Nottinghamshire, Leicestershire, Cheshire, Manchester and Scotland. Applicants will need to demonstrate need for their project, real community benefits and value for money. Projects funded in the past range from a primary school in West Sussex that engaged pupils to help elderly neighbours with their computers, to a project in the north of Scotland training unemployed people in building skills to support community groups and organisations. Money has also been allocated to several rural villages to buy potentially life-saving defibrillators.

<u>Scotmid Community Grants (Scotland)</u> This grant is **open to applications**. The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Scotmid Co-operative is offering small grants to assist and support community projects and initiatives throughout Scotland. Funding is concentrated on the areas of Children/education; Community Groups; Active Lifestyles; Environment; the Elderly; Homelessness; Fairtrade; Arts & Culture; and Charity. To be eligible for funding, applicants must be a group or individual acting for the wider benefit of the local Community; and live within the geographic boundaries of one of Scotmid Regional Committees.

Rank Foundation Leadership Awards (UK) This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Rank Foundation is a grant-giving charitable trust which supports causes in the UK. The School Leadership Award is one of the foundation's earliest structured programmes, through this scheme the foundation offers financial support to a small number of pupils in the Sixth forms of selected schools who are thought to have outstanding leadership potential and who need financial support to complete their education. This financial help comes in the form of assistance with school fees in independent schools or university tuition fees if in maintained schools. Those who receive an award must spend two weeks working for a not-for profit organisation and are also invited to attend a Leadership day in London.

<u>Classics for All (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Classics for All, which aims to develop the teaching of classics such as Latin, Greek, classical civilisation and ancient history in UK state schools has opened its 2018 grants programme. The focus of the grant making is on providing direct support for schools, consortia of schools and other partners interested in engaging with Classics, especially in areas where there is limited or no access to school provision. Some of the activities CfL will support are: Start up sessions eg after school clubs; Introducing classical languages; Developing Classics; Introducing Classics to the curriculum; Classics across the curriculum and Strengthening teaching capacity.

<u>Buttle UK Employment Education and Training Grants Programme (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Buttle UK provides packages of support worth up to £2,000 to young people who receive no support from their parents or guardians to help them to further their education or employment. To apply, the young person must have a clear education, training or employment goal that they are pursuing or want to pursue within 3 months of applying. Grants can provide direct financial support; help them to set up home and/or to improve their emotional, mental or physical well-being. Some of the essential items that may be funded are: Equipment to take up a training opportunity; interview clothes; a computer for study; travel costs to college; essential household items; recreational or social activities and counselling.

<u>Local Schools Nature Grants Scheme</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Local Schools Nature Grants Scheme allows schools in England, Scotland & Wales to apply for £500 worth of outdoor resources, and a two hour training session. Operated by Learning through Landscapes, the scheme is funded by Postcode Local Trust which receives funding from players of People's Postcode Lottery. Schools whose learners are aged 5+ and are passionate about making environmental improvements for the benefit of their pupils, staff and the community can apply to receive equipment to the value of £500 selected from a list of 72 items. Funded schools will show how they will make great use of the equipment and training supplied by the programme. The ideal partners will include children in the decision making and incorporate their local community.

Less CO2 (UK)This grant is open to applications.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

The LESS CO2 sustainable schools programme is a free energy efficiency programme available to any UK school. Through a series of half day workshops spread through the year, peer mentoring, expert advice and resources, staff are empowered and equipped to make changes and improvements to their school to reduce their energy usage, save money on bills and lower their CO2 emissions.

<u>Wilko - Helping Hands (England, Scotland & Wales)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Every Wilko store has a budget to enable it to provide a helping hand to local groups and community projects. Support can be in the form of raffle prizes to help with fund raising, products such as tins of paint to be used on community projects or volunteers to help with work in the community. Applications are welcome from schools, playgroups, nurseries, parent or family groups, disabled groups, youth clubs, elderly groups, luncheon clubs, community and tenants' associations, local police, fire service and local councils. Wilko is unable to support political parties, private or fee - paying schools, branches of national charities, profitable organisations or third party private fundraising groups.

Music For All (UK) This grant is open to applications.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

Music for All is a charity that believes that music is an extremely powerful means of communication, can help to break down cultural barriers and that everyone should have the opportunity to learn to play music. The charity provides funding for individuals to help them to access both musical instruments and lessons to help them to fulfil their musical dreams. It also provides funding for community music groups and educational organisations who have projects that aim to bring music to their community. Grants to groups aim to help them to fulfil their potential and become truly sustainable music programmes. Typical grants for groups are normally in the region of £2500, there are no maximum grant amounts detailed for individuals. There are normally three rounds of funding each year.

<u>Aldi Scottish Sports Fund (Scotland)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. The closing date will be confirmed on website.

Grants of up to £500 are available to charities, schools and other organisations in Scotland that run sporting activities for the benefit of the local community. The funding is being made available through the Aldi Scotlish Sport Fund is administered by Aldi Scotland. Each region has a different application deadline, please see the Aldi website for details of regions and the associated deadlines. Funding has previously been granted to a trampoline club to purchase a new double mini trampoline and a ski group to subsidise travel costs for regional skiing competitions. Each year approximately £50,000 is available.

<u>Persimmon Community Champions (England, Scotland and Wales)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Persimmon Homes Charity Foundation is providing grant funding of up to £1000 to registered charities, clubs, schools and other organisations which have already raised vital funds themselves towards projects to enhance their local community. The total available each month to support local good causes is £60,000. The type of projects supported to date have included support for foodbanks; projects within schools; and sports projects; etc.

<u>Transforming Scottish Indoor Tennis Fund (Scotland)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

Sportscotland has allocated a total of £15million to invest into Scottish indoor tennis facilities over the course of the next 10 years. Priority will initially be given to transformational projects which involve a minimum of 3 indoor courts and are located in six areas: Dumfries & Galloway; Dundee; Edinburgh; Glasgow; Highland and the Scottish Borders. The funding is available to Community Tennis Networks consisting of organisations such a local Tennis Clubs and Schools, etc. Funding of up to 66% of total project costs is available up to a maximum of £250,000 per court. Grants will be available through a series of funding rounds each year.

<u>Hays Travel Foundation (UK)</u>This grant is **closed to applications**.

Hays Travel Foundation was created in 2015. The foundation works with organisations that support people, who for one reason or another need help to achieve their potential. The foundations focus is on the following objectives: Education; Poverty; Health; Art's and Culture; Sport. Support is provided to registered charities working with young people under the age of 25 in an area where Hays Travel operates.

<u>Ironmongers Foundation Stem Grants (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Ironmongers' Foundation wishes to support initiatives that encourage talented young people to study science subjects at school and go on to pursue engineering-related further education or vocational training. Preference will be given to projects engaging young people from disadvantaged backgrounds. Participants must be under the age of 25. Activities must be within the UK, with a preference for urban areas outside London and particularly areas in the north and midlands with a manufacturing presence.

<u>Variety Charity – Sunshine Coaches (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Variety is a children's charity that aims to improve the lives of children and young people throughout the UK who are sick, disabled or disadvantaged. The Variety Sunshine Coach Programme exists to enable schools and non-profit making groups and organisations catering for sick, disabled and/or disadvantaged children to obtain a Sunshine Coach. The Sunshine Coach should be used to take the children out on educational and recreational activities which would otherwise be unavailable to them. The vehicle should be in use at least 4 to 5 times per week by the applicant organisation. Four different types of coaches are available: 14-seater minibus; 17-seater minibus; 13-seater with tail lift; 17-seater with tail lift. Applicants will be required to make a donation to the Sunshine Coach Programme as part of the application.

<u>Ernest Cook Trust - Outdoor Essentials Grant (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Ernest Cook Trust is an educational charity who aim to help the nation better understand the environment. Through the Outdoor Essentials Grant is a £500 award to UK State funded Primary and Secondary Schools to enable them to get their pupils learning outdoors.

<u>The Newby Trust - Education Grants (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Newby Trust funds local, regional or national charities registered and operating in the UK within the broad categories of education, health and social welfare. Through the Education programme the Trust provides grants of up to £10,000 to enable people to benefit from educational opportunities and to support excellence.

<u>The Newby Trust - Social Welfare (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

The Newby Trust funds local, regional or national charities registered and operating in the UK within the broad categories of education, health and social welfare. Through the Social Welfare programme the Trust provides grants of up to £10,000 to improve people's quality of life in disadvantaged communities.

<u>The British Academy - GCRF Networking Grants (UK/International)</u> This grant is **closed to applications**.

The British Academy is the UK's national body for the humanities and social sciences – the study of peoples, cultures and societies, past, present and future. Through the GCRF Networking Grants programme the British Academy provides financial support to allow researchers from developing countries and the UK to forge new links and hold networking events to generate innovative and interdisciplinary research ideas to address global challenges.

<u>Clyde 2 - Cash for Kids (Glasgow & West Scotland)</u> This grant is **open to applications**. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Clyde 2 Cash for Kids distributes money to registered charities, to individuals to pay for specialist equipment, to sports organisations and to specialist projects for schools & playgroups; Projects must be for the benefit of young people under the age of 18; who are disabled and have special needs or who come from underprivileged backgrounds.

<u>Linnean Society of London - Local Nature Grant Scheme (UK)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

The closing date will be confirmed on website.

The Linnean Society of London offers grants for youth-led projects in the UK, aiming to increase access to local natural spaces and encourage a deeper appreciation and understanding of nature. Some examples of possible proposals could be: running a school festival about nature; painting community murals showcasing biodiversity in

the area; building a community garden; creating a nature walk; hiring a speaker to come and talk about local foraging.

<u>Inspiring Scotland - Scottish Government Outdoor Clothing Fund (Scotland)</u>This grant is **open to applications**.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

Inspiring Scotland strives for a Scotland without poverty or disadvantage. The organisation works with people, their communities, charities and public bodies to develop solutions to some of the deepest social problems. Through the Scottish Government Outdoor Clothing Fund Inspiring Scotland provides grants to enable providers of funded early learning and childcare to purchase outdoor winter clothing for the children in their settings who need it most. The Government has made a total of £1million available.
